

Paddling Trail Map Helena Run

Lake County



SAFETY TIPS

- Prepare a "float plan." Leave a paddling route and return time with a relative or friend.
- Secure your car and take keys with you; and remember a cell phone to call emergency personnel, if the need arises, at 9-1-1.
- When in a group, assign boats to be the lead and sweep. Preferably both boats should be manned by experienced paddlers with no one in the group passing the lead boat or falling behind the sweep.
- Watch for motorboats. Stay to the right and turn your bow into the wake.
- Do not approach or harass alligators, as they can be dangerous. It is illegal to feed wildlife. Blueway trails are shared with alligators, nesting birds and other wildlife. Please observe, but do not disturb.
- Avoid canoeing or kayaking alone, or at night.
- Law requires persons in vessels less than 16 feet long, including canoes and kayaks, must have either a wearable or throwable PFD for every person on board.
- Make mental notes as you pass trail markers — knowing the location of the closest marker will help emergency personnel should you need assistance.

The Helena Run Blueway is one of eight featured waterway trails in the Lake County Blueways Program.

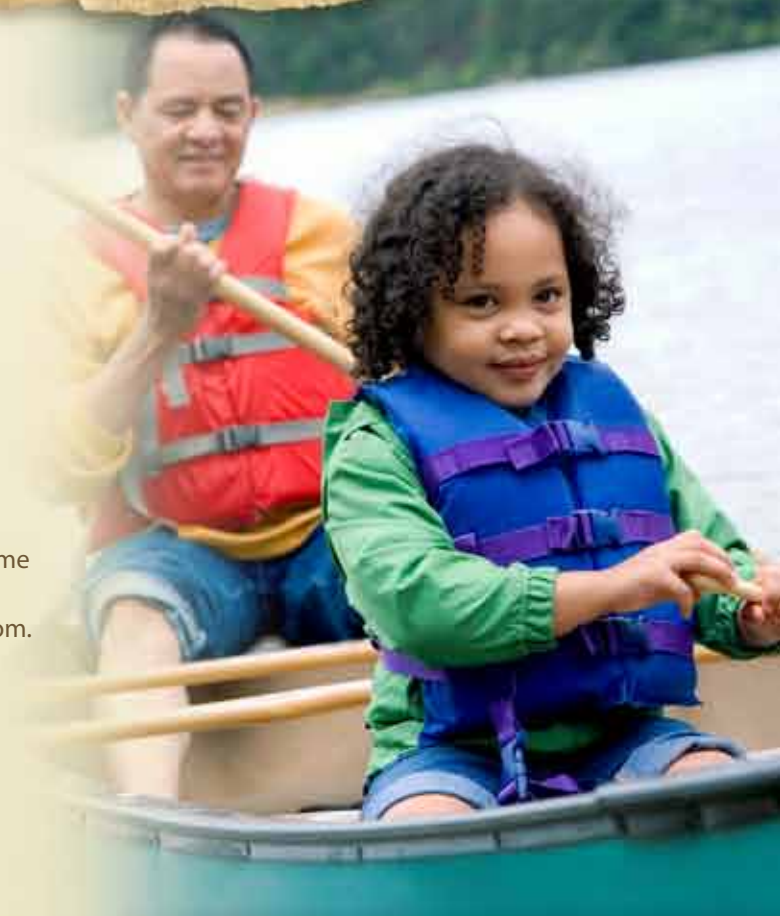

HELENA RUN

With an entry point at the City of Leesburg's Singletary Park, Helena Run skirts the west side of Lake Harris before entering Helena Run,

which this Blueway trail was named after. About two miles into Helena Run, paddlers will come to a fork. To the left is Bugg Spring Run, which winds to Bugg Spring, and to the right is Lake Denham.

From Helena Run to Lake Denham, this run immerses paddlers in the Lake County Water Authority's 2,300-acre Flat Island Preserve. This preserve is a popular location for bird watching, hiking and primitive camping.

A canal north of Lake Denham leads to a dock and a 440-foot boardwalk, which connects to Daubenmire Trail, the main loop trail of the preserve. Canoes, paddles and floatation devices are available at the end of the boardwalk. Call the Lake County Water Authority at (352) 343-3777 for details.



FEATURED WILDLIFE: Florida Red-bellied Cooter

LENGTH: 8 to 15 in.

ACTIVE: Year-round, it is often seen basking with Florida Cooters and River Cooters on logs or floating mats of vegetation

DIET: Mostly herbivorous, but will also eat carrion, such as dead fish

INTERESTING FACT: Easily identified by distinctive red-tinged belly and two cusps on its upper beak
